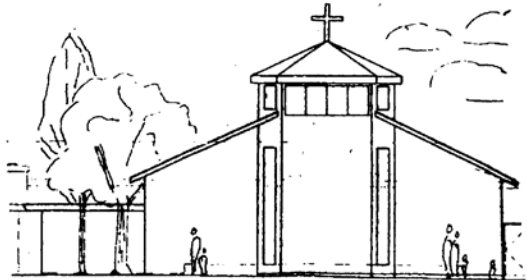

A sermon preached on April 27th, 2014 based upon John 20:19 – 29 entitled “Missing Church.”

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the religious authorities, Jesus came and stood among them

and said, “Peace be with you.” (John 20:19)

What really happened all those years ago in that tomb in which Jesus’ ravaged, dead boy was placed when they took him down from the cross? Did Jesus really rise up out of the tomb? The answer to that question can’t be “proved” one way or another.



The one compelling piece of evidence that something truly extraordinary took place is found in the **transformation** of the disciples. The Gospels make it clear they were not the “best and the brightest.” They were ordinary men, fishermen and the like, who had witnessed, from afar, the full horror of what a Roman crucifixion was all about. Their leader had suffered a slow and excruciating death meant to send a message. “Challenge our authority and you will also end up here.”

There had been countless other movements, not unlike the one Jesus had started, with a leader who healed and taught and at times made claims of being the anointed one sent by God. And in the end, when the leaders of these movements died at the hands of the authorities, they were soon forgotten.

It should have been the same with the Jesus movement. John succinctly described their emotional state on that first Easter. They were huddled in fear, having locked the doors, indeed, locked away from life. There was likely a good deal of self-condemnation to deal with as well. They were, in all likelihood planning their escape back to Galilee, lest the same people who arrested Jesus would come and arrest them as well.

The movement should have died with Jesus on the cross.

But it didn’t. It took off like wild fire. A remarkable transformation took place in the souls of those first disciples. They moved from fear and despair to faith, hope and love.

What can account for such a transformation? A hoax wouldn’t do it. In our story, the disciples have already heard from Mary that she has seen Jesus alive, but it didn’t penetrate their fear and despair. A hoax wouldn’t either.

The first followers are unanimous in their explanation of this transformation. They had experienced Jesus alive again. He had given them the peace the world cannot give – he gave them a peace to weather every storm that would face.

After he said this, Jesus showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord.(20:20)

John makes a point of telling us that the wounds of the crucifixion remained on Jesus’ risen body. We all suffer in various ways in this life. We wouldn’t choose this suffering, but, the grace of God our sufferings can be the means through which our souls are shaped.

The scars express something beautiful; the love forged in the cauldron of suffering.

The resurrection stories insist that Jesus' body itself — not merely his spirit — has been raised from death. The idea here is that a person can't really exist apart from some kind of body. A ghost — a disembodied spirit — isn't real life.

Jesus has a body — the same body — but it is obviously a transformed body — what Paul calls the "resurrection body" — a body created for life in the realm of life that exists beyond this world. That's why Jesus told Mary not to hold him, and why he apparently could pass through the locked doors of the room the disciples were hiding in. Normally we can't see resurrection bodies, but in this case, flesh and blood human beings are granted the capacity to see Jesus.



Jesus said to them, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." (20:21-23)

We, the followers of Jesus are given a mission. We are sent into the world that God loves so (3:16) to testify to that love revealed in Jesus — the love that redeems people from the pit of despair and self-centeredness that keeps us cut off from God — to embody the love that releases people from the power of sin and death.

We don't do this on our own authority, or our own power. Jesus breathes the Holy Spirit into his disciples — into us — the Spirit he has promised to be with us as we journey through life.

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." (24-25)

So Thomas missed church that night. Why, we don't know, but he missed out on seeing what the disciples saw. (Take note! When you miss church you risk missing out on something really good and unexpected.)

Thomas has often been seen as a model of how we're not supposed to be. He's called "doubting Thomas." But that's not fair. He loved Jesus, was willing to accompany Jesus to Jerusalem, knowing the outcome of their trip would likely mean the death of them all. (John 11:16)



And loving Jesus so, Thomas was traumatized by the horror of what happened to Jesus on the cross. He's fixated on those wounds through which he was tortured and killed. He states that he won't believe unless he can touch those wounds.

But really, what he's asking for is that he be allowed to see what the others have seen.

Thomas is a stand in for most of us. He's our twin. Faith doesn't come easily. Like the father who came to Jesus with a very sick son, we, too can say,

“Lord, I believe, help my unbelief.”(Mark 9:24) And there are times when the unbelief part seems far stronger. If only we could be allowed to see something that would take away all our doubts, all our uncertainties, all our darkness and confusion.

This story isn't about Thomas falling short as a disciple because he can't get past his doubts – it's about how gracious God is in meeting us where we are.

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them.(20:26a)

A point worth noting: The other disciples didn't cast Thomas out of the circle because he wouldn't believe what they told him. There was room in the circle for Thomas with all his doubts.

There are plenty of churches in this world where you can't really belong unless all your beliefs line up right with what the people calling the shots require. Conform, suppress your doubts or be banished.

That's not how we do it here. Because of Jesus, *there is room in the circle for everybody.*

Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, “Peace be with you.” Then he said to Thomas, “Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe.” Thomas answered him, “My Lord and my God!” (20:26b – 28)

So Thomas didn't miss church the following Sunday night the way he did the previous Sunday night. He was there with his brothers and sisters who loved him even as he continued in his state of doubt.

At the outset of John's Easter story, Jesus appears to Mary Magdalene when she was all ***alone***. (*John 20:14-16*) Sometimes that still happens. But it's not the most common way through which faith is born. As was the case for Thomas, more often than not faith is born by hanging out in the company of others in whom faith is present and lived out.

We absorb the world view of those we hang out with. Hang out with people who are driven by their fears, living their lives hunkered down behind locked doors, people who assume there's no help out there, only people trying to take advantage of you, and you will likely find yourself less inclined to take a risk. Your fears will rule your life. Hang out with people for whom retribution, not forgiveness is the guiding principle when someone wrongs them, and you will likely feel obliged to hold onto your anger, waiting for a way to pay back in kind someone who harms you.

Hang out instead with a group of people who get their bearings from Jesus — people who, imperfect as their attempt may be try to open themselves up to Jesus' gift of peace in this world, and before long you will find yourself doing the same.

You'll start noticing strange coincidences that you might have otherwise missed. Some sort of help that you need suddenly shows up which in the past you wouldn't have either noticed or allowed yourself to receive. You weren't expecting help to show up. Or perhaps an opportunity shows up to share a gift you've been given which before you wouldn't have taken note of because you were too stuck in the hunkered-down mentality of simply surviving this dangerous world. This new way of being in the world is the work of the Holy Spirit which Jesus has breathed upon those who make the choice to follow in his way.



Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." (20:29)

We didn't live during the time when Jesus' was making resurrection appearances after his death. So we are those who "have not seen." But faith continues to be born here as we gather in Jesus' name, sharing our lives in that strange mixture of vulnerability and strength that is revealed when the Holy Spirit moves among us, opening our hearts to God and one another.
